

REPORT ON THE 2019 ACTIONS
OF THE
CITIZENS ADVISORY BOARD TO MANAGE WILDLIFE
FOR DOUGLAS COUNTY

The Douglas County Citizens Advisory Board to Manage Wildlife (CAB) meets the Monday or Tuesday prior to scheduled meetings of the Nevada Wildlife Commission- generally this is typically 8 meetings per year. Following is a summary of actions taken by the CAB during CY 2019.

Met with members of the Carson City and Washoe County CABs to discuss wildlife issues common to the three areas along the Sierra Front.

Discussed the possibility of Topaz Lake becoming a year round fishery as a result of potential California Dept. of Fish and Game's fishing regulations changes.

Discussed the feasibility of introducing the Outdoor Adventure Program into the Douglas County School District curriculum.

Discussed potential recommendations to change the temporary fishing permit process to make acquiring temporary permits easier for youth

Discussed the merits and drawbacks of the on-line Hunter Safety Certification Program.

Made recommendations to the Nevada Wildlife Commission regarding:

- Statewide big game application deadlines, eligibility, seasons and quotas
- Statewide small and migratory game seasons and bag limits
- Statewide big game and upland game releases
- Statewide fishing seasons and possession limits
- Statewide Predation Management Plan
- Proposed legislation affecting hunting, fishing, trapping, boating and wildlife/habitat
- Wildlife project funding using Upland Game and Duck Stamp funds, Heritage Tag funds, Dream Tag funds
- Various regulations, including, but not limited to: public and sellable lists; big game tag transference, deference and return program, special fishing regulations on the Truckee River; a special Veteran and Active Military waterfowl season; the landowner compensation tag program; shed antler seasons, live bait and tackle restrictions in Western and Southern Regions.
